Public Safety Report
2nd Quarter (Apr. - June), 2021

Statistical Highlights

During the 2nd quarter (Apr. - June) 2021, there were 32 reported NIBRS Group A offenses, compared with 32 for the 1st quarter of 2021 and 44 during the same quarter last year. Officers made 17 in-custody or field release arrests in Q2 2021 compared to 11 in Q1.

In Q2, our officers made 578 traffic stops, resulting in 306 violations (52.9%), and 473 warnings (81.8%). Of the 306 violations, 148 were for speeding and 16 were for speeding in a school zone.

During Q2, West Lake Hills Police Officers responded to 550 calls for service, compared to 444 calls for service in Q1. Officers also conducted 134 close patrol checks for residents who were out of town, compared to 65 for Q1.

New Hire

Officer Jeremiah Madrigal was sworn in on June 9th. We are excited to have him as a new member of the Department and we look forward to working with him and getting him trained to the point where he can work on his own.

Community Events

Officers worked and participated in the annual July 4 parade this year. It was nice to finally get together in a group setting after last year's event was cancelled due to COVID-19. No incidents were reported during the parade this year.

STR Locations

There were no 911 calls for service at any of the 10 locations listed as Short-Term Rental locations for this quarter. Year-to-date there have been no calls at any Short-Term Rental location.

Training

Officers completed 189 hours of training during this quarter, compared to 187 during Q1. Many of the classes taken this quarter were online and included Internet Security and Cybersecurity Awareness. Other classes taken included Simunition: Scenario Instructor and Safety Certification Course, Police Chief's Leadership Series, Women in Command, and Impaired Driving Enforcement.

COVID-19

The COVID-19 numbers in the Austin MSA were at Stage 3 or Stage 2 during this quarter. As a result, we had more traffic enforcement than we have had since early 2020 and the enforcement numbers reflect this.
